## A New Chapter Built on Hope & Healing

Episcopal City Mission (ECM) hosted its first virtual event on October 8 with the theme, "A New Chapter Built on Hope and Healing." As with many things in 2020, the Coronavirus required us to be more creative and go to a virtual format.

Thank you to all of you who registered and attended the VIP Experience and the main Gala event! We are also extremely grateful for our event and auction sponsors, along with those who made donations even if they were unable to attend. Our first virtual event raised over \$70,000!

The VIP experience held prior to the gala featured the music of Brian Owens, an outstanding local artist, performer, and a young man committed to the youth of St. Louis. He and his colleagues provided beautiful music, along with a song written and performed by a young man mentored by Brian. In addition, Brian shared his experience working with the children and staff at the County Detention Center. He spoke about the importance of ECM's work and encouraged attendees to support ECM's work.

The main gala event started with a warm, live welcome by our mistress of ceremonies, Ann Marie Ruhlin. She guided our attendees through their virtual experience and live auction bidding with auctioneer, Fletcher Lane. Our attendees were able to communicate with everyone and bid on live auction items using the "chat" feature on Zoom, while silent auction items were bid on via a mobile phone application.

Mark Jordan, the ECM Board chair, opened the gala with comments about the vision of ECM and how ECM is preparing for "a new chapter built on hope and healing." He stated the juvenile justice system is evolving, and ECM is evolving with it. The Family Courts now detain fewer youth, while serving others under court supervision in the community. ECM in 2019 moved into community-based chaplaincy where we provide programming such as grief and loss groups to "court-involved" children who are living in the community with parents or in residential homes. The children in the detention centers today are those who are detained for more serious offenses or allegations.

Following Mark's comments, attendees were blessed by an inspirational keynote speech from The Rt. Rev. Deon K. Johnson, the 11th Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri. Bishop Deon spoke eloquently using the "starfish on the beach parable" as a comparison to the work done by ECM chaplains with children in the juvenile justice system. The way we can make the best – and probably most profound – change to help humanity, is just with one child (or starfish) at a time. He spoke about his experience working with the national church on the "school to prison pipeline," a process of criminalizing youth that is carried out by disciplinary policies and practices within schools that put students into contact with law enforcement. Bishop Deon stressed his support of ECM and the children we serve.

MIT would not be complete without a story by an ECM chaplain. However, the virtual format provided us the opportunity to provide a mission moment video providing firsthand experiences from chaplains, court volunteers and a detention supervisor. The stories shared the hearts and minds of the children we serve, along with their challenges. We hope these stories help our supporters better understand the children and how ECM chaplains provide support, hope and healing to the children.
