ECM chaplains spend a lot of time with teens in detention and over a period of time, they get to know some of the kids on a personal level. While the teens eventually leave the detention center, some of them never leave your heart. I often wonder how some of them are doing: Are they staying on the right track, were things resolved in their families... Sometimes one of them will pop in my mind and I'll say a prayer for them.

One afternoon, God allowed me to see one of the kids that I had spent some time with in Bible study, talking and praying with at detention.

I walked into a Subway that I often visit to order lunch. When I looked up to place my order, my eyes met the eyes of the teen behind the counter. We looked at each other and he said, "I know you." I said, "Oh yeah. How are you?" I did not want to say anything about the detention center. He said, "I'm doing good." The smile on his face warmed my heart!

He immediately began to share that after he finished his time, he caught up on all of his classes and that he had been working at Subway for a week. He was beaming with pride. I responded, "I am so happy for you and I am very proud of you." He continued to beam with pride in his bright green Subway hat and t-shirt.


He shared that he was going back to school in August and that he would be a high school senior. I said, "That is wonderful!" He prepared my order, I paid him and he responded with a thank you.

## There is Always Good.

**Bishop Deon Johnson** — Excerpts from the Moment in Time Keynote Presentation

"Tonight, we are painfully aware that there is no such thing as a bad person, but there are bad choices. One of the things our young people

remind us of is that they can not be defined by a single moment and a bad mistake. There is always good there, is waiting to be discovered and good that has always been there.

Our challenge, our call, our ministry is to look beyond that moment, beyond that act, and look at the child, the young person looking to be seen and to be heard. By your presence, by your donations, by all the things that you do in your ministry, you bring hope and healing in a place that is in need of hope and healing.

One of the things that I have come to realize that in many ways our society has become a fast food, throw away society. What I mean by that is we want quick results, we want to be sure that once we are done with it, we throw it away and not think about it. My prayer is that we never do that with people, particularly

young people. Our young people who find themselves making bad decisions and often end up in the juvenile system, often are looking for someone to care for them, to offer them a glimpse of a life that is changed. More importantly, looking to offer them hope and healing. I think that is particularly why our theme for tonight is Opening Doors to Hope and Healing."

"You may never meet these young people. You may never encounter these young people. But I can guarantee you that by your very presence, by your prayers, and by your support, you are transforming not just their lives, but the lives of their families, the lives of their communities.

Because anytime that we say to our young people that 'You matter, that you are enough, that your life and experiences matter in this world,' it is transformative."



## From a Child in Detention to a Chaplain





## "My experience as a child when I was brought to the detention center, I was eight years old.

At that time, we were being bussed out of the city to outlying schools during 'deseg.' And we were going through some horrendous stuff and so we were playing hooky, so to speak, out at Fairgrounds Park. A truant officer picked us up. Didn't understand why we were being brought here. They separated my sister and cousins from us. Took our shoes and belts and all of that and left us in these dark cells."

"As a chaplain, we are received very well by many of the juveniles here at the City and the County. Many of them don't have people who genuinely listen to them and don't judge them.

They need help. They need assistance. I'm not talking about sympathy. I'm talking about empathy. I'm talking about genuine concern and genuine help. I'm not talking about handouts. I'm talking about teaching, mentoring, and more than anything, setting an example of who we say we are as a society, who we say we are as an American."

"As a donor, you provide hope, you provide healing, you provide trust, you provide a future for many of these young people, because sometimes they have not had some of the simple things you might provide as a donor. Clothing, access to programming offering different kinds of services, mentors who come onboard. Sometimes even just a word of encouragement. Or a word of even correction because there are things they have to learn or unlearn. So you provide a whole other life for many of the young people"

# The IMPACT of Covid-19 on Our Youth



Episcopal City Mission has had to be flexible and creative during this time of the Covid-19 Pandemic to continue delivering our mission. The chaplains were challenged with finding ways to provide support to children in Detention, while not being able to meet with them in person from March 2020 to May 2021.

While ECM has been impacted in many ways by the pandemic, the greatest impact has been to the children we serve in the juvenile justice system.

### Here are some of the challenges the children in detention have endured:

- Many months of no in-person visitors, including family.
- Several days of quarantine when they enter the detention center or when a case of Covid-19 enters the center.
- While in quarantine, youth must be in their "cells" in a unit for 23 hours each day.
- Court hearings are delayed which leads to prolonged stays in detention and anxiety about when they might have some resolution to their cases.

In May 2021, ECM was granted limited in-person access to the youth at the St. Louis County Detention Center, and this continues today. As for the St. Louis City Detention Center, they are still closed to in-person visits.

ECM has been able to ease the impact thanks to our donors and volunteers who have provided virtual birthday parties and goody bags. Our chaplains have supported the children with pastoral care, programming and chapel services via Zoom sessions and telephone calls.

We pray that ECM's support, hope, and healing will bring peace and comfort to the youth during this difficult time.
