Who is an ECM Mentor?

- ❖ Passionate adults

ECM Mentors join in alongside the chaplains.

ECM's mentors are 21 years old or older and give support by listening and spending quality time with youth between ages 12-16 on a regular basis to develop self-esteem, positive attitudes and socially-appropriate behaviors through modelling, instruction, and encouragement.

Responsibilities:

- Spend at least 10 hours per month with a mentee
- Attend 2 group activities per month
- Attend mandatory quarterly mentor program meetings
- Log time spent together
- Have fun mentoring these children who need a positive role model in their lives



Why become a Mentor?

By becoming a mentor, you can help a child in our community know that they matter. Meaningful connection through mentorship is one way you can foster positive role model interaction and spiritual direction when appropriate.

We wish to invite mentors to join us who have a shared goal of building relationships and engaging in prosocial activities with the children in the juvenile justice system.
